The SSCE Cymru team would like to extend a heartfelt public thank you to this month's Seren, Julie Stapleton.

In her role as Teacher Development Officer at Neath Port Talbot Council, Julie has been an outstanding advocate for all Service children and young people across the local authority (LA). Her dedication shines through in her coordination of LA and school staff network meetings, securing funding and working closely with the SSCE Cymru team to ensure schools feel supported in their journey to becoming Armed Forces Friendly Schools. Thanks to Julie's collaborative approach, six schools in Neath Port Talbot have now achieved Armed Forces Friendly Schools Cymru status, an incredible accomplishment for an LA without any main military units or bases. To break it down: three schools have earned Bronze status, one has achieved Silver and two have reached Gold! This is a brilliant example of what can be achieved when schools and local authorities work together with purpose and passion

Julie, we are truly grateful for your efforts and thoroughly enjoy working alongside you. We also recognise that this work represents just a small part of your wider role, which makes your continued commitment all the more impressive.

SSCE Cymru's Armed Forces Friendly Schools (AFFS) Cymru initiative was launched in 2022. Schools in Wales complete a series of activities and actions that are linked to the SSCE Cymru School Checklist, including some compulsory elements, in order to achieve their Bronze, then Silver, then Gold status. The objectives are to embed good practice for supporting Service children, create a positive environment for Service children to share their experiences and encourage schools to become more engaged with their Armed Forces community.

This month, we are pleased to congratulate the following schools for achieving their AFFS Cymru status:

Bronze: Treffos Independent School & Nursery (Isle of Anglesey)

Silver: Pencoed Primary School (Bridgend) Silver: Rydal Penrhos School (Conwy)

Gold: Ysgol Cwm Brombil (Neath Port Talbot)

Congratulations to all schools who have achieved their Armed Forces Friendly Schools Cymru status. So far, 43 schools have achieved their AFFS Cymru status. 44 have achieved Bronze, 13 have achieved Silver and 7 have achieved Gold!!!















## Service children data collection 2025/26

SSCE Cymru are supporting local authorities to collect \*Service children data this year. Therefore, we kindly ask you to complete our online data collection form to confirm the number of \*Service children in your school and provide us with the most up to date accurate record of where Service children are across Wales.

**Note:** Please also let us know if you have no Service children currently enrolled at your school.

Previous data indicates that over 35% of schools in Wales have Service children enrolled, with around half of those only having only 1-2 Service children.




#### \*Welsh Governments definition of a Service child:

A 'Service child' has parent(s) or person(s) exercising parental responsibility who is/are Service personnel serving:

- In HM Regular or Reserve Armed Forces Royal Navy and Royal Marines; British Army and Royal Air Force, Or
- Is an Armed Forces Veteran who has been in Service within the past two years, Or
- One of their parents died whilst serving in the Armed Forces and the learner has received a pension under the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme or the War Pensions Scheme.

#### Why we ask you to capture data on Service children:

- Identifying Service children allows schools to provide them with appropriate support
- Schools can access funding to support the needs of their Service children
- Comparisons can be made on attainment levels between Service and non-Service children
- Local authorities can prepare to support Service children with their mental health and wellbeing needs
- SSCE Cymru can provide schools with support, resources and training to better understand and support their Service children based on their unique experiences and needs.

## SSCE Cymru e-learning

Last year, SSCE Cymru launched our highly anticipated NEW on-demand, bi-lingual, e-learning training package on Supporting Service children in education in Wales!!!!

Funded by the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust, the SSCE Cymru e-learning training package has been designed to give educators the tools and confidence to understand and support the needs of Service children within their education settings in Wales however, the training can be accessed by anyone who would like to learn more about supporting Service children within education.

This FREE training package consists of nine topics and will take roughly two hours to complete. Your progress will be saved so that you can continue where you left off and revisit the training as required.

## SSCE Cymru ALN survey

Over 2024/25 SSCE Cymru conducted two surveys about the experiences of supporting Service children with Additional Learning Needs (ALN).

The initial survey was conducted with schools across 2024 and 2025.

In Spring 2025 a second survey was conducted with local authorities.

The aim was to capture a snapshot of the challenges and positives both schools and local authorities may be facing in supporting Service children with ALN, to identify examples of good practice and consider what further support schools and local authorities might need.
















### Remembrance 2025

#### **Events**

#### **Remembrance Sunday**

9<sup>th</sup> November

Remembrance Sunday is a national opportunity to remember the service and sacrifice of all those that have defended our freedoms and protected our way of life.



11th November

The Armistice, an agreement to end the fighting of the First World War as a prelude to peace negotiations, began at 11am on 11 November 1918.

We mark Armistice Day around the UK with a 2-minute silence at 11am on the 11th day of the 11th month.

#### **Army RET Remembrance Live Assembly**

09:00-09:30 Tuesday 11th November

The Army Regional Engagement Team (RET) from Wales will be delivering a live assembly of Awareness and Remembrance for all schools.

The event is open to all year groups and available in English and Welsh.

#### **RBL Remembrance Live Assembly**

10:25-11:05 Tuesday 11th November

The Royal British Legion will host an online assembly for ages 9 to 14 (years 5-9). This event will combine art, music, poetry, interviews and more to create a unique, interactive experience helping students understand who, why and how we remember.



#### **Teaching Remembrance resources**

Produced by the Royal British Legion, all resources are:

- Available for all key stages and Youth Groups
- Made up of lesson plans, bitesize activities and assemblies to support teachers and parents
- Free and linked to National Curriculum
- Differentiated to provide both support and challenge
- Available in Welsh.

Poppy Scotland provide a range of FREE learning resources highlighting the importance of remembrance, veterans and the poppy.

#### **BBC**

The BBC have free teaching resources for Primary and Secondary aged pupils. CBeebies also have an alternative video for the 2-minute silence for young children.


#### Supporting Service Children in Education in Wales Fund (SSCE-WF)

In 2025/26, schools and local authorities (LAs) in Wales can apply for funding throughout the year, to deliver projects specific to supporting Service children in education, linked to the curriculum in Wales.



Ariennir gan Lywodraeth Cymru Funded by **Welsh Government**  £1,000 projects – open to all schools and local authorities in Wales.

£3,000 projects – open to schools who have achieved their Armed Forces Friendly Schools Cymru Bronze status and all local authorities.

#### SSCE Cymru case management support

Case management is available to schools that have an individual Service child or a very small number of Service children with a specific need related to the impact of their Armed Forces lifestyle.
