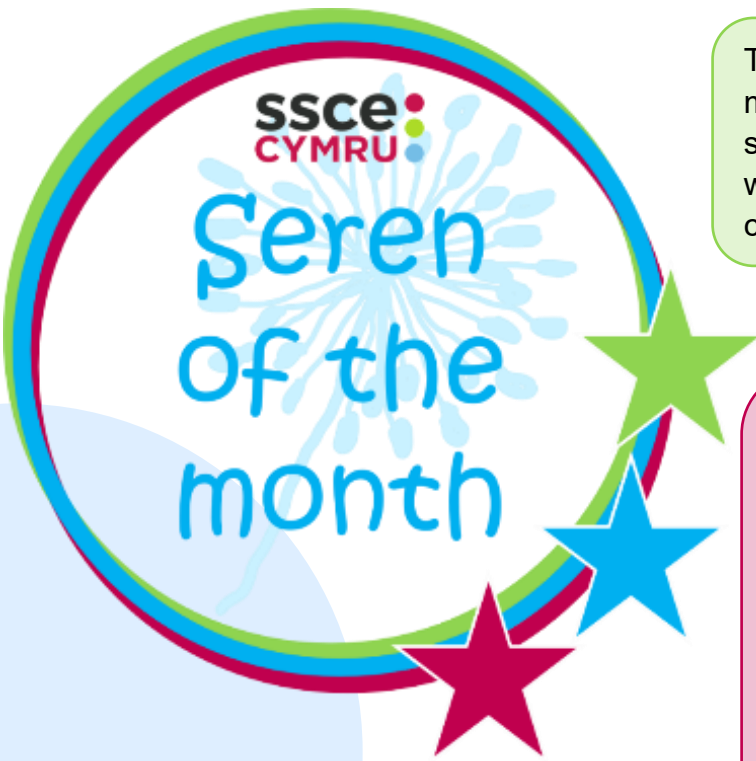

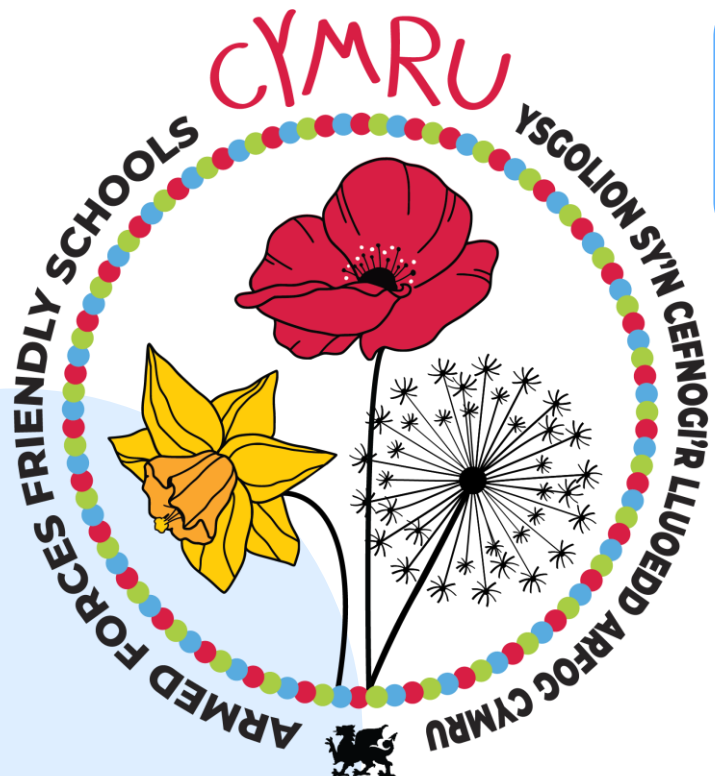

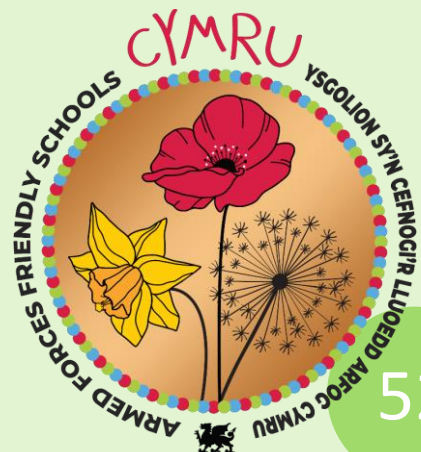
SSCE Cymru's Armed Forces Friendly Schools (AFFS) Cymru initiative was launched in 2022. Schools in Wales complete a series of activities and actions that are linked to the SSCE Cymru School Checklist, including some compulsory elements, in order to achieve their Bronze, then Silver, then Gold status. The objectives are to embed good practice for supporting Service children, create a positive environment for Service children to share their experiences and encourage schools to become more engaged with their Armed Forces community.

This month, we are pleased to congratulate the following schools for achieving their AFFS Cymru status:

Bronze: Porthcawl Comprehensive School (Bridgend)

Gold: Cwmclydach Primary School (Rhondda Cynon Taf)

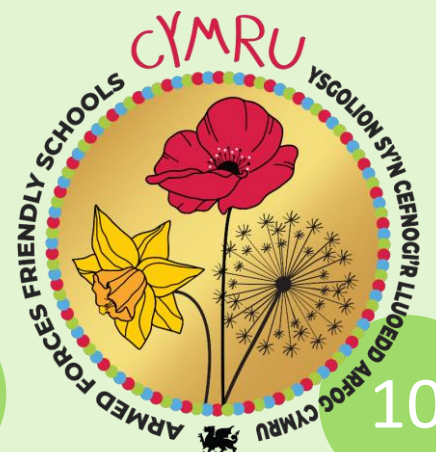

Service children data collection 2026/27

SSCE Cymru are supporting local authorities to collect *Service children data this year. Previous data indicates that over 35% of schools in Wales have Service children enrolled, with around half of those only having only 1-2 Service children.

Why we ask you to capture data on Service children:

- Identifying Service children allows schools to provide them with appropriate support
- Schools can access funding to support the needs of their Service children
- Comparisons can be made on attainment levels between Service and non-Service children
- Local authorities can prepare to support Service children with their mental health and wellbeing needs
- SSCE Cymru can provide schools with support, resources and training to better understand and support their Service children based on their unique experiences and needs.

New Welsh Government definition of a *Service child (from April 2026):

A *Service child* is a child whose parent(s) or carer(s) with parental responsibility who:

- **Currently serves** in the HM Regular or Reserve Armed Forces – Royal Navy or Royal Marines, British Army, or Royal Air Force,
- **Previously served** in the Armed Forces and left within the past six years,
- **Died while serving** in the Armed Forces, and the child receives a pension under the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme or the War Pensions Scheme.

SSCE Cymru also encourages schools to consider identifying children and young people who are connected to the Armed Forces.

NOTE: Please also let us know if you DO NOT have any Service children currently enrolled at your school.

Funding

Supporting Service Children in Education in Wales Fund (SSCE-WF)

Schools and local authorities in Wales can apply for grant funding to deliver projects and interventions during the 2026/27 academic year, to provide support for Service children who meet the Welsh Government's definition of a Service child. There are three grants available.

Small project grants

Schools and local authorities in Wales can apply for a small grant to deliver a project which provides support to their Service children.

Up to £500 projects – open to all local authorities and local authority maintained schools in Wales.

Up to £1,000 projects – open to all local authorities in Wales and local authority maintained schools in Wales that hold a valid Armed Forces Friendly Schools Cymru status.

Priority themes:

- Academic support
- Wellbeing support
- Service children voice.

Application deadlines:

Round 1: 9th October 2026

Round 2: 11th December 2026

Month of the Military Child grant

Schools and local authorities in Wales can apply for up to £500 to deliver activities and celebrations during Month of Military Child in April.

Application deadline:

12th February 2027

Intervention grant

Schools in Wales can apply for up to £500 to provide short-term, targeted support for an individual Service child or a small number of Service children, to help address immediate barriers to learning, wellbeing, and engagement due to the impact of the Armed Forces Lifestyle.

Applications can be submitted at any time throughout the academic year and will be reviewed within 14 days of submission.

Funding

Service Pupil Support programme 2027

The MODs Service Pupil Support (SPS) programme will award grants between £5,000 to £150,000 towards a standalone project being delivered over a period of up to two years, to supporting Service children along their educational pathway.

The SPS programme is open to schools, Further Education settings and local authorities.

NOTE: Schools are encouraged to work collaboratively and apply in a cluster.
